Context/ Drivers

- 1. 5 Year Forward View (5YFV) sets out a clear vision, setting out the particular contribution that the NHS and others can make to the health of our nation, and the transformation required to meet the changing needs of current and future patients.(Oct 2014)
- 2. Achieving World Class Cancer Outcomes (AWCCO) Independent Cancer Taskforce published their strategy setting out how we in England could achieve the very best cancer outcomes by 2020. (July 2015)













Lancs & South Cumbria Cancer Alliance

• Pivotal to taking the AWCCO strategy forward is the establishment of Cancer Alliances across the country, bringing together key partners at a regional level, including commissioners, providers and patients. The Alliances will drive and support improvement and integrate care pathways, using a set of key measurements to understand variation and support service redesign.

Sustainability and Transformation Partnerships / Integrated Care Systems

One STP/ICS called 'Healthier Lancashire & South Cumbria' which has 8 Work Streams:

- Primary and Community Care
- Mental health (including)
- Learning Disabilities; and
- Children and Young People's health and wellbeing
- Prevention and population health
- Care Sector care at home and care homes
- Urgent and Emergency Care
- Acute and Specialist services (Cancer sits in this work stream)













Local delivery

- Pennine Lancashire Cancer Partnership Group supports the Cancer Alliance to realise the National Cancer Strategy and its ambitions in terms of transformation and outcomes
- Pennine Lancashire Tactical Group -provides a forum for a collaborative approach to performance monitoring and management of cancer waiting time targets
- Collaborative working with Acute Trust/ Local Authority/ Macmillan/ CRUK / other third sector organisations as required













National Screening programmes

- Breast screening 3 year programme
- Bowel cancer screening new FIT test, new improved home test kit for screening being rolled out this summer
- Cervical screening current local campaign to encourage 25 year olds to attend screening.
 Women aged 25-30 are less likely to accept an invitation for screening than those in their 30s and 40s
