Call to stay vigilant as crime rises by 10%

Police-recorded crime has risen by 10% across England and Wales – the largest annual rise for ten years - according to the very latest Office for National Statistics figures.

The figures show almost 5 million crimes in England and Wales were recorded by the police for the 12 months to March this year – up 10% on the same period in 2015/16.

Police recorded 458,021 more offences compared with the previous year, which the ONS said was driven by an increase in violence – police recorded an 18% rise in violent crime, including a 20% surge in gun and knife crime.

Jayne Pascoe, Strategic
Partnerships Director for
Neighbourhood Watch, said: "We
have also seen a rise in burglary
and robbery but we do need to be

mindful that these recent increases should be seen in the context of substantial falls in such crimes over the last 20 years.

"However it's timely to remind supporters of the importance of staying vigilant and looking out for each other and being aware of what's happening in our neighbourhoods – and shows that Neighbourhood Watch is needed now just as much as ever."

Jayne added that modern menaces are also behind the crime increase.

"What the figurers do show is the widespread prevalence of cybercrime – see Page 6 on how you can protect yourself from this now all too common, crime. That's why we're working hard on helping our supporter help themselves and their neighbours to protect themselves from cybercrime."

The official figures also show a 26% rise to 723 in the homicide rate, which includes the 96 cases of manslaughter at Hillsborough in 1989.

Interestingly, the statisticians say the rise in crime is accelerating, with a 3% increase recorded in the year to March 2015, followed by an 8% rise in the following year, and now a 10% increase in the 12 months to this March.

She thanked volunteers for their help in reducing traditional crimes such as burglary and car crime over the last three decades and asked them to now turn their attention to raising awareness of cybercrime, domestic violence, child sexual abuse, human trafficking and extremism.

DogsTrust

Working with Dogs Trust to prevent the heartbreak of a stolen pet

Dog theft is on the rise, and as such, Neighbourhood Watch and Dogs Trust are urging the public to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity.

In 2016 alone, nearly 1,800 instances of dog theft were reported to police forces across England and Wales. Information obtained by Dogs Trust through a



Freedom of Information request also reveals that gardens, closely followed by the home, are the most common areas from which dogs were reported stolen.

Lee Paris, Campaigns Officer at Dogs Trust, told *Our News*: "It is a sad day when we have to issue these types of warnings, but with instances of dog theft becoming more prevalent, we want to ensure that dog owners are aware of the dangers so that they can help keep their beloved pets safe. Theft of any item is distressing, but when a dog is stolen, who many consider a part of the family; the experience can be even more distressing."

The most common breed of dog reported as stolen was the Staffordshire Bull-terrier, followed then by the Jack Russell, Chihuahua and the Bulldog. But Dogs Trust warns that any dog, whatever the breed, is at risk of theft if left unsupervised.

Lee continues: "By making small changes to the garden and the home, and by registering to a local Neighbourhood Watch scheme, we hope we can help reduce the number of dog theft instances. The message we want to get across when it comes to garden security is that we want to keep the dog in, but keep thieves out!"

As such, Dogs Trust advises never to leaving your dog unattended, and has put together the following advice on how to help protect your dog from the risk of theft and what to do should the worst happen.

Whether you own a dog or not, intruders should not be able to access your garden or property.

Holidaymakers urged to watch new counter terrorism safety video

Counter Terrorism police - in association with the Foreign Office and ABTA – The Travel Association - have launched a new four minute film outlining what to do if caught up in an attack.

Whilst the chances of being involved in a terror attack abroad remain low, holidaymakers travelling abroad are being urged to watch the video designed to help keep them safe in the event of an incident.

The key advice is:

Run – to a place of safety. This is better than trying to surrender or negotiate.

Hide – it is better to hide than confront. Barricade yourself in, turn your phone to silent and use only when it is safe to do so.

Tell – Make sure you know the local emergency numbers in the country

you're travelling to. For all EU countries the number to call is 112.

Lord Ahmad of Wimbledon, FCO Minister for National Security and Counter Terrorism says, "We want people to be safe so they can enjoy their holidays. As well as reading and taking note of our travel advice and taking out appropriate insurance, I encourage people to watch this film before they go away." Watch the video here

Tackling Disability Hate Crime – it's up to all of us!

Neighbourhood Watch is working to highlight the issue of Disability Hate Crime within our communities.

We've teamed up with the Disability Hate Crime Network (DHCN) to provide our supporters with information and resources to help people better understand the impact and extent of this issue in our neighbourhoods.

NHWN's Strategic Partnerships Director Jayne Pascoe explains why we're so passionate about this issue.

She said: "From bullying at school, harassment and name calling on the street, to abuse and exploitation in their own homes, there is a significant amount of disabled people affected by disability hate crime and some for whom it is an almost daily occurrence and happening so often that they do not even think to report it to the police. In a caring society it is unacceptable that this abuse is allowed to continue.

"In the Neighbourhood Watch network we have a movement of people who care about the safety of their communities and who, by acting together, can have a significant impact on reducing crime in their neighbourhoods. It is right and timely that this caring is extended to the reducing the victimisation and public abuse of disabled people."

Gill and Eric Faulkner enjoyed our visit to the BBC studios in Cardiff to take part in *Crimewatch Roadshow*.

The couple – who have been married for 51 years - help run Neighbourhood Watch in their home town of Connah's Quay, Flintshire, North Wales.

"We were fed up with crime in our area and I wanted to move house to get away from it," said Eric. "We were approached by Neighbourhood Watch to get involved and I was sceptical whether it could make any difference."

Gill added: "But we went to a meeting in the local pub with Neighbourhood Watch and the police and they promised us that we would all work together to make it better. And it has – 100% - it's made a huge difference."

Gill has won a prestigious Respect Award – for her "outstanding dedication to promoting respect" in her community and is no stranger to tackling crime head-on.

She said: "We were going to bed one night at about midnight and saw three people go into my neighbour's garden. She's a single mum and I knew she was at home alone with her children. Eric rang the police and I rang her to tell her what was happening.

"The three people were dismantling a hammock in the garden and taking parts of it away but the police came straight away and arrested them – that's what it's about – looking out for your neighbours."

And Neighbourhood Watch is just one of the many community programmes Gill and Eric are involved in. They have to be some of the busiest volunteers we know!

The couple are both town councillors - Gill is a former chair of Connah's Quay Town Council. Gill is chair of Friends of Flintshire Citizens Advice Bureau, vice-chair of Flintshire Neighbourhood Watch OWL Eastern, a school governor and secretary to a local residents' association.

Gill and Eric are both on the local Sea Cadets committee and help run a memory café!

They also find time for their three grown-up children, six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and their many beloved pets!

CLOSING THE DOOR is as easy as PUTTING DOWN THE PHONE!



With latest statistics showing crime is on the increase, door step crime is sadly no exception, with over 200,000 reported cases of doorstep crime in the UK in 2016.

Whilst everyone is a target, this often affects the more vunerable people who open their doors to strangers. These doorstep thieves thrive on the good manners of homeowners who often struggle to say no and use numerous tactics to try and obtain money or goods fraudulently. Some examples of tricks doorstep theives employ are:

- Collectiing for a bogus charity
- Insisting a home repair is imperative and charging extortionate rates (often never carrying out the work)
- Pretending to be someone official to gain entry to your home (e.g. A Policeman or meter reader)
- Distracting you whilst someone else enters your property via another entry point, perhaps at the rear of your home.

Doorstep thieves often win on personality and are good actors. They can appear credible and their story is quickly believeable, but even when the householder does note something isn't right, they are often intimidated into continuing the conversation, making it very difficult for them to say no and close the door.

How an intercom can help you?

The ERA Video Door Intercom is a video door intercom perfect for your home. It has a portable handset for easy carrying around the home or you can choose to add additional bases in different rooms of the home.

When someone rings your doorbell, you can see them on the video screen and choose if you want to speak to them; you can simply ignore if the caller isn't known to you. If you do choose to speak to them, you can do so with the knowledge that it is much easier to put down the phone on a nuisance door caller, than it is to close the door; you don't have to open the door. Finally if you do wish to open the door, you can do so in person, or press the door unlock button; you can open the door without getting up. (this feature only works if you have had an electronic door lock fitted by a professional)

As an added feature, the E3000 will take a photo of everyone who rings your doorbell and maintains a log you can view later, which shows their image along with the time and date - great if you are out or need to look back on a caller for some reason later.

It also has an anti-tamper alarm, so if someone tries to remove the doorbell or batteries in an attempt to force you to come to the door, an alarm goes off on your handset to alert you.

STAYING SECURE ONLINE



SIMPLE ADVICE FROM OUR PARTNER CYBER AWARE

Staying secure online can often seem complicated, but it doesn't have to be. The Government's Cyber Aware campaign, which follows advice and technical expertise from the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC), a part of GCHQ, offers the following simple advice to help you to improve your online security.

The key behaviours to help you improve your online security are:

Install the latest software and app updates

- They contain vital security updates which help protect your device from viruses and hackers
- Security updates are designed to fix weaknesses in software and apps which could be used by hackers to attack your device. Installing them as soon as possible helps to keep your device secure
- You can choose to install updates at night when you are asleep and your device is plugged in or set your mobile or tablet to automatically update your apps when you are connected to Wi-Fi and an update is available
- You can also set laptops and desktops to automatically install software updates when an update is available

Use a strong, separate password for your email account (you can use three random words or numbers to create a strong password).

- Hackers can use your email to access many of your personal accounts, by asking for you password to be reset, and find out personal information, such as your bank details, address or date of birth, leaving you vulnerable to identity theft or fraud
- Having strong, separate passwords for your most important accounts means that if hackers steal your password for one of your less important accounts, they can't use it to access your most important ones
- Make sure your password is easy for you to remember, but not easy for others to guess e.g.
 Pa55word may follow the rules of using letters and symbols but is well known amongst hackers as a common password
- Don't use words which would be easy to discover from your social media accounts, such as your child's name or favourite sports team

Other behaviours which can help keep you secure online include:

Secure your tablet or smartphone with a screen lock

- Give your device an extra layer of security by setting it to lock when you aren't using it
- Screen locks provide an extra layer of security to your device, as each time you want to unlock it or turn it on, you will need to enter a PIN, pattern, password or fingerprint
- This means if someone gets hold of your device they can't access the data on your device without entering your password, pattern, PIN or fingerprint

Always back-up your most important data

- Safeguard your most important data such as your photos and key documents by backing them up to an external hard drive or a cloud-based storage system
- If your device is infected by a virus or accessed by a hacker, your data may be damaged or deleted, which means you won't be able to access it. Backing up your data means you have another copy of it, which you can access

Final tips:

- Remember that spammers could also gain access to a friend's account, so if you get an uncharacteristic email containing a link from a friend, do not click on it but find another way of contacting them to check that the message is genuine.
- Leave a website if you feel suspicious if the site doesn't look or 'feel' right, if there is text that doesn't appear to have any purpose or doesn't tie in with the rest of the site, or if you feel uneasy for any reason.
- Regularly check your social media privacy settings to control exactly what you're sharing with whom.
- If you're going away on holiday, don't advertise it on social media!
- If you use a wireless network at home, passwordprotect it.
